

The Right to Education: Universal Declaration of Human Rights (1948)

Is this right being violated?

What does Universal Declaration of Human Rights say about Education?

- Everyone has the right to education.
- Education should be free, at least in the elementary and fundamental stages.
- Elementary education shall be compulsory.
- Higher education should be accessible to all based on merit.
- Education should promote understanding, tolerance, and friendship among all nations.

What does the Right to Education entail?

1. Free and Compulsory Education: Universal access to basic education without cost.
2. Equal Access: All children, regardless of background, should have the same educational opportunities.
3. Development of Human Personality: Education aims to build dignity, respect, and social awareness.
4. Promotion of Peace and Tolerance: The educational system should foster international understanding.

Is this right being violated?

- Access to Education: Millions of children worldwide are denied access to basic education due to poverty, conflict, and gender discrimination.
- Quality of Education: In some countries, education may be available but of low quality.
- Inequality in Higher Education: Disparities in access to higher education exist, particularly for marginalized communities.
- Impact of Conflicts: Ongoing conflicts and humanitarian crises often disrupt education systems and prevent children from attending school.
