clan	<i>noun</i>	a large family, or a group of people who share the same interest
clan	<i>noun</i>	a group of families, especially in Scotland, who originally came from the same family and have the same name
promulgation	<i>noun</i>	the public announcement of something, especially a new law
promulgation	<i>noun</i>	the process of spreading beliefs or ideas among a lot of people
promulgate	<i>verb</i>	to announce something publicly, especially a new law
promulgate	<i>verb</i>	to spread beliefs or ideas among a lot of people
negotiable	<i>adjective</i>	able to be discussed or changed in order to reach an agreement
negotiation	<i>noun</i>	the process of discussing something with someone in order to reach an agreement with them, or the discussions themselves
negotiate	<i>verb</i>	to have formal discussions with someone in order to reach an agreement with them
domestic	<i>adjective</i>	relating to a person's own country
privileged	<i>adjective</i>	having a privilege
privilege	<i>noun</i>	an advantage that only one person or group of people has, usually because of their position or because they are rich
colonialism	<i>noun</i>	the belief in and support for the system of one country controlling another
colonial	<i>adjective</i>	relating to a colony or colonialism
colony	<i>noun</i>	a country or area controlled politically by a more powerful country that is often far away
foster	<i>adjective</i>	used to refer to someone or something connected with the care of children, usually for a limited time, by someone who is not the child's legal parent
foster	<i>verb</i>	to encourage the development or growth of ideas or feelings
foster	<i>verb</i>	to take care of a child, usually for a limited time, without being the child's legal parent
institutionalize	<i>verb</i>	to make something become a permanent or respected part of a society, system, or organization
institutionalize	<i>verb</i>	to send someone, especially someone who is not able to live independently, to live in an institution (= a place such as a hospital)
tackle	<i>verb</i>	to try to deal with something or someone

legacy	<i>noun</i>	something that is a part of your history or that remains from an earlier time
legacy	<i>noun</i>	money or property that you receive from someone after they die
dismantle	<i>verb</i>	to show that a claim, statement or explanation is not true or correct
dismantle	<i>verb</i>	to get rid of a system or organization, usually over a period of time
dismantle	<i>verb</i>	to take a machine apart or to come apart into separate pieces
apartheid	<i>noun</i>	(especially in the past in South Africa) a political system in which people of different races are separated
overthrow	<i>noun</i>	an occasion when someone or something is removed from power using force
overthrow	<i>verb</i>	to defeat or remove someone from power, using force
reconciliation	<i>noun</i>	a situation in which two people or groups of people become friendly again after they have argued
reconcile	<i>verb</i>	to find a way in which two situations or beliefs that are opposed to each other can agree and exist together
abuse	<i>noun</i>	the use of something in a way that is harmful or morally wrong
abuse	<i>verb</i>	to treat someone cruelly or violently
abuse	<i>verb</i>	to use something for the wrong purpose in a way that is harmful or morally wrong
constitutional	<i>adjective</i>	allowed by or contained in a constitution
constitute	<i>verb</i>	to be or be considered as something
constitution	<i>noun</i>	the set of political principles by which a state or organization is governed, especially in relation to the rights of the people it governs
revolutionize	<i>verb</i>	to completely change something so that it is much better
revolutionary	<i>noun</i>	someone who tries to cause or take part in a revolution
revolutionary	<i>adjective</i>	involved in or relating to a revolution
revolution	<i>noun</i>	a change in the way a country is governed, usually to a different political system and often using violence or war
revolt	<i>verb</i>	If a large number of people revolt, they refuse to be controlled or ruled, and take action against authority, often violent action
coalition	<i>noun</i>	the joining together of different political parties or groups for a particular purpose, usually for a limited time, or a government that is formed in this way
