be under/on oath		to have formally promised to tell the truth
oath	<i>noun</i>	a promise, especially that you will tell the truth in a law court
sacred	<i>adjective</i>	considered too important to be changed
sacred	<i>adjective</i>	considered to be holy and deserving respect, especially because of a connection with a god
mall	<i>noun</i>	a very large building or buildings containing a lot of stores and often restaurants, and usually with space around it outside for parking
creed	<i>noun</i>	a set of beliefs that influences the way you live
firm	<i>adjective</i>	fixed at the same level or opinion and not changing
firm	<i>adjective</i>	well fixed in place or position
seizure	<i>noun</i>	a sudden failure of the heart
seizure	<i>noun</i>	a very sudden attack of an illness in which someone becomes unconscious or develops violent movements
seizure	<i>noun</i>	the action of taking something by force or with legal authority
seize	<i>verb</i>	to take using sudden force

seize	<i>verb</i>	to take something quickly and keep or hold it
grudgingly	<i>adverb</i>	unwillingly
grudging	<i>adjective</i>	A grudging action or feeling is one that you do or have unwillingly
grudge	<i>noun</i>	a strong feeling of anger and dislike for a person who you feel has treated you badly, especially one that lasts for a long time
loyalty	<i>noun</i>	the quality of being loyal
loyal	<i>adjective</i>	firm and not changing in your friendship with or support for a person or an organization, or in your belief in your principles
fair play	<i>noun</i>	fair and honest treatment of people
fair play	<i>noun</i>	in sport, the fact of playing according to the rules and not having an unfair advantage
tolerable	<i>adjective</i>	of a quality that is acceptable, although certainly not good
tolerance	<i>noun</i>	willingness to accept behaviour and beliefs that are different from your own, although you might not agree with or approve of them
tolerate	<i>verb</i>	to deal with something unpleasant or annoying, or to continue existing despite bad or difficult conditions
tolerate	<i>verb</i>	to accept behaviour and beliefs that are different from your own, although you might not agree with or approve of them

scale	<i>noun</i>	the relation between the real size of something and its size on a map, model, or diagram
scale	<i>noun</i>	a set of numbers, amounts, etc., used to measure or compare the level of something
pat	<i>verb</i>	to touch someone or something gently and usually repeatedly with the hand flat
concrete	<i>adjective</i>	clear and certain, or real and existing in a form that can be seen or felt
prosperous	<i>adjective</i>	successful, usually by earning a lot of money
prosper	<i>verb</i>	(of a person or a business) to be or become successful, especially financially
prosperity	<i>noun</i>	the state of being successful and having a lot of money
rugged	<i>adjective</i>	(of land) wild and not even; not easy to travel over
obscuration	<i>noun</i>	the act of preventing something from being seen or heard, or something that prevents something else from being seen or heard
obscurity	<i>noun</i>	the state of being not clear and difficult to understand or see
obscurity	<i>noun</i>	the state of not being known to many people
obscure	<i>adjective</i>	not clear and difficult to understand or see
obscure	<i>adjective</i>	not known to many people
the fainthearted		people who are not brave

fainthearted	<i>adjective</i>	Someone who is fainthearted is not confident or brave and dislikes taking unnecessary risks
faint	<i>verb</i>	to suddenly become unconscious for a short time, usually falling down
feel faint		to feel weak, as if you are about to become unconscious
not have the faintest idea		used to emphasize that you do not know something
faint	<i>adjective</i>	not strong or clear; slight
pursuit	<i>noun</i>	an activity that you spend time doing, usually when you are not working
pursuit	<i>noun</i>	the act of following someone or something to try to catch him, her, or it
pursuit	<i>noun</i>	the act of trying to achieve a plan, activity, or situation, usually over a long period of time
pursue	<i>verb</i>	If you pursue a plan, activity, or situation, you try to do it or achieve it, usually over a long period of time
pursue	<i>verb</i>	to follow someone or something, usually to try to catch him, her, or it
pass on something		to give something to someone, after someone else gave it to you
endurance	<i>noun</i>	the ability to keep doing something difficult, unpleasant, or painful for a long time

endurable	<i>adjective</i>	the fact that something difficult, unpleasant, or painful is possible to deal with
endure	<i>verb</i>	to suffer something difficult, unpleasant, or painful
affirmation	<i>noun</i>	a statement or sign that something is true
affirm	<i>verb</i>	to state something as true
reaffirm	<i>verb</i>	to give your support to a person, plan, idea, etc. for a second time; to state something as true again
scripture	<i>noun</i>	the holy writings of a religion
strangle	<i>verb</i>	to stop something from developing
strangle	<i>verb</i>	to kill someone by pressing their throat so that they cannot breathe
recrimination	<i>noun</i>	arguments between people who are blaming each other
grieve	<i>verb</i>	to make you feel sad and angry
grieve	<i>verb</i>	to feel or express great sadness, especially when someone dies
grievance	<i>noun</i>	a complaint or a strong feeling that you have been treated unfairly
petty	<i>adjective</i>	not important and not worth giving attention to
proclamation	<i>noun</i>	an official announcement
proclaim	<i>verb</i>	to announce something publicly or officially, especially something positive
in accordance with a rule, law, wish, etc.		following or obeying a rule, law, wish, etc.

discordance	<i>noun</i>	a disagreement, or the quality of not being in agreement with something or someone else
accord	<i>noun</i>	(a formal) agreement
discord	<i>noun</i>	the state of not agreeing or sharing opinions
a conflict of interest		a situation in which someone cannot make a fair decision because they will be affected by the result
conflict	<i>verb</i>	If beliefs, needs, or facts, etc. conflict, they are very different and cannot easily exist together or both be true
conflict	<i>noun</i>	an active disagreement between people with opposing opinions or principles
dove	<i>noun</i>	a white or grey bird, often used as a symbol of peace
