Gendarme(pn)	French police officer
Hostage(pn)	a person seized or held as security for the fulfillment of a condition
Siege (n)	a military operation in which enemy forces surround a town or building, cutting off essential supplies, with the aim of compelling those inside to surrender
Victim (pn)	a person harmed, injured, or killed as a result of a crime, accident, or other event or action
Attacker (pn)	a person or animal that attacks someone or something
Culminate (v)	reach a climax or point of highest development
Petty crime	a type of crime that is not considered serious when compared with some other crimes
State prosecutor	a lawyer who acts for the government against someone accused of a crime in court
Surveillance (n)	the careful watching of a person or place, especially by the police or army, because of a crime that has happened or is expected
Radicalism (n)	the belief that there should be great or extreme social or political change
Proximity (n)	the state of being near in space or time
Obtain (v)	get
Monitor (v)	to watch and check a situation carefully for a period of time in order to discover something about it
Interior Minister	a member of the government who is in charge of domestic affairs
Outskirts (n)	the areas that form the edge of a town or city
Military barracks	a building or group of buildings where soldiers live
Riot police squad	MAT (GR)
Punctured (adj)	to make a small hole in something
Evacuate (v)	to move people from a dangerous place to somewhere safe
Volunteer (v)	to offer to do something that you do not have to do, often without having been asked to do it and/or without expecting payment
Swap (n)	Exchange
Storm (v)	to attack a place or building by entering suddenly in great numbers
Praise (v)	to express admiration or approval of the achievements or characteristics of a person or thing
Release (n)	an occasion when someone is allowed to leave prison
Suspect (pn)	a person believed to have committed a crime or done something wrong
Solitary confinement	a punishment in which someone is kept in a room alone, usually in a prison
Investigation (n)	the act or process of examining a crime, problem, statement, etc. carefully, especially to discover the truth
Intelligence (n)	secret information about the governments of other countries, especially enemy governments, or a group of people who collect and deal with this information
Convict (v)	to decide officially in a law court that someone is guilty of a crime
Offence (n)	an illegal act; a crime
