Grammar Guide

1. Nouns & Quantifiers

Nouns:

Nouns are people, places, things, or ideas.

- Countable nouns: things you can count. (apple, chair, book)
- Uncountable nouns: things you can't count. (milk, sugar, air)

Quantifiers:

Words we use before nouns to show amount or quantity.

Quantifier	Use with	Examples
many	countable	I have many friends.
much	uncountable	She doesn't drink much coffee.
a lot of / lots of	both	We saw a lot of birds.
some	both	I have some water and some pens.
any	both (negative & questions)	Do you have any eggs?
few / a few	countable	A few people came. (Few = almost none)
little / a little	uncountable	A little milk is left. (Little = almost none)

2. Modals

Modals help us show ability, possibility, advice, or obligation.

Modal	Use for	Example
must	strong rule or necessity	You must wear a seatbelt.
mustn't	prohibition (not allowed)	You mustn't cheat on a test.
don't have to	not necessary	You don't have to do homework now.
may / might	possibility	It may rain. / I might be late.
should	advice (good idea)	You should eat healthy food.
shouldn't	advice (bad idea)	You shouldn't stay up all night.

- **Tip**: After modals, always use the base verb:
 - She **should go**, not *should goes*.
 - You **must eat**, not *must eating*.

3. VS Comparative & Superlative Adjectives

We use adjectives to compare things!

Comparatives (2 things):

Add **-er** or use **more**:

- taller (tall)
- more interesting (interesting)

Form:

- Short adjective: $Adj + -er + than \rightarrow$ "This book is **shorter than** that one."
- Long adjective: more + adj + than → "This film is more exciting than the last one."

∑ Superlatives (3+ things):

Add **-est** or use **most**:

- the tallest
- the most interesting

Form:

- Short adjective: $\mathbf{the} + \mathbf{adj} + \mathbf{-est} \rightarrow$ "He is \mathbf{the} fastest runner."
- Long adjective: the most + adj \rightarrow "She is the most talented."

Spelling Rules:

- Big → bigger (double consonant)
- Happy \rightarrow happier, happiest (change y to i)
- Good \rightarrow better, best
- Bad \rightarrow worse, worst
